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WANT TO SHOW YOUR ANIMAL AT THE FAIR? REGISTER YOUR ANIMAL WITH THE STATE FIRST

The Wisconsin Livestock Premises Registration Act requires anyone who keeps, horses, or co-mingles livestock to register their premises (animals). Premises that are not currently licensed by the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) are required to register.

Registering your premises gives animal health officials a valuable tool when responding to animal disease outbreaks. It also allows livestock owners to stay informed about disease threats to their animals.

A state system with proper trace back and trace forward capabilities provides timely response to minimize the economic impact in the event of an animal disease outbreak. Our livestock industry is vitally important to the economic well-being of Wisconsin, which makes their safety a major issue for the state.

HOW DO I REGISTER?

Registering a livestock premises does NOT obligate the registrant to participate in animal ID or animal tracing.

WHAT ANIMALS NEED TO BE REGISTERED BEFORE YOU SHOW THEM AT THE FAIR?

Livestock species include:

- Goats
- Poultry (chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, guinea fowl, and squab)
- Captive game birds (pheasants, quail, wild turkeys, migratory wildfowl, pigeons and exotic birds)
- Sheep
- Farm raised deer (elk, moose, caribou, reindeer and the subfamily musk deer)
- Camelids (llamas, alpacas)
- Ratites (rheas, ostriches, emu, cassowary, kiwi)
- Fish (aquaculture farm)

But do not include:

- Rabbits
- Dogs
- Cats

ATCP 160.01 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class, such as Holstein in the dairy class.
- (2) "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop, or food; or a specific age, age group, or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- (2m) "Conference judging" means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.
- (3) "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third, and fourth class selections as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (b).
- (4) "Department," as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in other contexts, "department" means the state of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, trade, and Consumer Protection.
- (5) "Division" means one of three exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to the junior division, open division, and senior citizens division.
- (6) "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
- (7) "Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
- (7e) "Face-to-face judging" means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases:
 - (a) Get acquainted.
 - (b) Learn the background of the exhibit.
 - (c) Self-evaluation.
 - (d) Evaluator comment.
 - (e) Parting.
- (7m) "Fair" means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s.93.23 (1) (b) or (c), Stats.
- (7s) "Fair board" means the governing entity of a fair.
- (8) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
- (9) "Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.
- (10) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
- (11) "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third, and fourth class selection as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (c).
- (12) "Self-determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria:
 - (a) The fair board approves it.
 - (b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.
 - (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.
 - (d) A member of a youth organization carries it out.
- (13) "Youth organization" means an organization under adult leadership with educational programming.

ATCP 160.02 Premium requirements.

- (1) GENERAL. (a) The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch.ATCP 10 that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
 - (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify actions taken by a fair.
 - (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.
 - (e) No fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.
 - (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.
- (2) PREMIUM LISTS.
- (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).

(b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request. (c) Sections ATCP 160.01 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) ENTRY FEES.

(a) A fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee, stall rents for animals, or both.

(b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. If no entry fee is charged, any other exhibitor may be required to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not exceeding that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES.

(a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year. (b) Except as provided under par. (c), The department may not pay state aid for a fair with split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split dates based on hardship.

(c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates with advance notification to the department:

7m. Mechanical projects. 8. Other exhibits and contests similar to those identified in subsds. 1. to 7. (d) If there are split dates under par. (b) or (c), all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography, or educational display to repeat a demonstration/exhibit.

ATCP 160.03 Exhibition requirements.

A fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

(1) No fair society/other organization sponsoring a fair may require an exhibitor to become member of the organization to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor may the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as donation to the fair society/require an exhibitor in any other way to donate to the society.

(2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.

(3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.49 (7).

(4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. on the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animal on the ground.

ATCP 160.05 Open division; general requirements.

(1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into multiple premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for the last place in the class. (2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

(3) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.

(4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in open class division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.

(5) The fair board may establish specific classes by professional and amateur level groupings within classes for open class departments 14 to 28.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements.

- (1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.
- (2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration. (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.
- (3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.
- (4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.
- (5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

ATCP 160.91 Judging regulations.

- (1) Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.
 - (1m)
 - (a) An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years.
 - (b) An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year. (c) A fair representative may request the department waive par. (b) in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.
 - (2) Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.
 - (3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.
 - (4)
 - (a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division.
 - (b) When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.
 - (c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.
 - (4g) When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (4) (b) and (c) to award placements in a class.
 - (5) If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.
 - (6) Special educational exhibits may be established if the proposal is presented to the department before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.
 - (7) Within any junior fair department, a fair may establish special classes where none are specified under this subchapter. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under this subchapter.
 - (8) The fair board may establish specific classes are age or grade level groupings within classes for each of the junior fair departments 14 to 16, 18, 20 to 29, 31, 33, and 34.
 - (9) Judging in the junior fair division may be done using the regular, face-to-face, conference or Danish judging system.

ONEIDA COUNTY FAIR 2025

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

All persons entering exhibits agree to abide by the rules and regulations regarding entries, exhibits, judging, ribbon payment, and general conduct of the Oneida County Fair.

GUIDELINES TO REMEMBER

- The Fair Team reserves the right to review exhibitor/ribbon/premium status.
- Ribbons and premiums are only given for exhibits or demonstrations at the county fair.
- Adults and youth exhibiting in the Open Division may enter no more than one per lot in all classes, including poultry and rabbits.
- Open Division Fair Book is for all entries not eligible for the Junior Division Fair Book.
- Youth exhibitors may exhibit items in any Open Division department but not the same item as entered in the Junior Fair Division.
- The Open Division Entry Form is found after the Department listings at the back of the Fair Book
- All exhibits must be entered into the correct department, class, and lot number. Incorrectly entered exhibits may be disqualified.

JUDGING CRITERIA

- No exhibit may be given a higher rating than it deserves compared to the standard for its class.
- Articles not deserving a ribbon will not receive one. The judge's decision is final.
- All Open Division Exhibitors will receive a confirmation letter and judging schedule via mail/email.
- All exhibits MUST REMAIN until 4 p.m. on Sunday. (unless approved)
- The Oneida County Fair WILL NOT be responsible for damage or loss to any exhibit but will exercise every possible precaution in safeguarding exhibits.

OPEN DIVISION PROCEDURES

All exhibitors in the Open Division shall be residents of Oneida County.

ENTRY PROCEDURES FOR EXHIBIT COURT

- Non-animal exhibitors check in at the County Fair Office. You will receive your exhibit tags and be directed to where exhibits should be placed.
- Open Division judging schedules will be sent to you if you choose in-person judging.
- Attach tags to exhibits and keep the tag stub to retrieve your exhibits on Sunday. Exhibits will not be released without a stub!

ENTRY PROCEDURES FOR ANIMAL EXHIBITS

- All animal health papers must be brought to the exhibit court with your animal. You will be asked to provide proof of inoculations and/or disease-free certificates. Exhibitors of purebred animals may be required to furnish either registration papers or a letter from the breed organization stating that the animal's application has been received as proof the animal is purebred.
- After checking in with attendant and unloading your animal in the proper pen, cage or stall, exhibit tags can be picked up in the Exhibit Area.
- For caged or penned livestock, exhibit tags must be fastened to the animal cages or pens. Keep the exhibit tag stub to retrieve your exhibits on Sunday night.
- The following Departments are to bring animals for the day of judging only: Dept. 11 (Exotic Domestic Animals).

Exhibitors of animals that are housed at the fair:

- Exhibitors must supply their feed, bedding, and appropriate cage.
- Exhibitors shall bring feed and water troughs with their animals and are responsible for feeding/watering animals at least twice daily and keeping a fresh water supply available to animals
- Exhibitors shall keep animals and pens/stalls clean and provide clean bedding, as needed, each day.
- Exhibitors shall keep equipment, feed, and bedding clean and orderly in designated areas.
- All exhibitors shall clean out their cages, pens, and/or stalls before their animal leaves the fairgrounds on Sunday's release. FAILURE TO DO SO WILL CAUSE LOSS OF PREMIUMS!!!!

On judging day, exhibitors of all animals shall be ready to exhibit their animals per the judging schedule. If there is a scheduling conflict, notify the Attendant BEFORE judging begins. No one except the Department Judge, Exhibitor, and Attendant shall be allowed in the show ring during the judging of any Classes.

OPEN DEPARTMENT 5 - GOATS ATCP 160.15

The age of an animal for determining the appropriate lot is computed from the opening day of the fair. Male goats and goats with full natural horns may not be entered unless full natural horns are a standard for the specific breed. Does which have freshened shall be shown in the appropriate lot. All goats may be grade, purebred or cross. The age categories for dairy goats are as follows:

- A Junior doe kid; under 4 months of age.
- B Senior doe kid; at least 4 months but under 7 months of age.
- C Junior yearling doe; at least 7 months but under 12 months of age.
- D Senior yearling doe; at least 12 months but under 24 months of age and not freshened.
- E Yearling milker; under 2 years of age and in milk.
- F Junior milker; at least 2 years but under 3 years of age.
- G Mature milker; at least 3 years but under 5 years of age.
- H Aged milker; 5 years of age and older.

Class A Breed

First through fourth premiums are awarded for each lot as: \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00 respectively.

- 1. Junior doe kid
- 2. Senior doe kid
- 3. Junior yearling doe
- 4. Senior yearling doe
- 5. Aged milker
- 5. Yearling milker
- 6. Junior milker
- 7. Mature milker
- 8.

Class B Fleece (Does or Wethers Only)

First through fourth premiums are awarded for each lot as: \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00 respectively.

- 1. Junior Kid (under 6 months of age)
- 2. Senior Kid (over 6 months but under 1 year)
- 3. Yearling (1 year but under 2)
- 4. Intermediate (over 2 but fewer than 5)
- 5. Senior (5 years or older)

Class C Utility Goats

This class is intended to show the versatility of the goat beyond its more widely accepted uses for milk, meat and fleece. First through fourth premiums are awarded for each lot as: \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00 respectively.

- 1. Driving or Cart Class (must be shown with cart, but may have second handler with a lead-line)
- 2. Pack Goat (must be shown under saddle, and on lead)
- 3. Other (list use on entry form)

OPEN DEPARTMENT 7 - POULTRY ATCP 160.17

A "Best of Show" ribbon will be awarded to one animal exhibited in this Department. All birds must be at least six (6) weeks old. The age categories for poultry are as follows:

- A Roosters/Hens are old male or female birds hatched before January 1 of the exhibit year.
- B Cockerels or Pullets are young birds hatched on or after January 2 of the exhibit year.

All poultry and waterfowl, including chickens, guinea fowl, pea fowl, ducks, geese, turkeys and pheasants, ostriches and emus, shown in public exhibition must:

a. Originate from one of the following certified flocks and have a current (not expired) certificate as proof

1. NPIP participating flock or hatchery
2. NPIP affiliate flock or dealer
3. Wisconsin Tested Flock
4. Wisconsin Associate Flock

OR

b. Be individually tested negative for *S. pullorum* and in the case of turkey's test negative for pullorum disease and *Mycoplasma gallisepticum*. Birds individually tested must be sexually mature (4 months of age for poultry except turkeys which are 6 months or older) and be individually identified with a leg or wing band. Individual tests must be within the 90 days preceding the fair and a Wisconsin Individual Poultry test report is required as proof.

Birds which do not originate from a certified flock and are sexually immature may not be tested or presented for show, fair or exhibition.

If all your birds are under the mandatory blood testing age: exhibitor must have proof that all birds originated from a certified flock and apply for WI Associate Flock status. If your flock has both younger and older than 4-month-old birds you must have all the older birds tested and have proof of younger birds originating from a certified flock and apply for WI Tested Flock. The state has up to 30 days to approve or deny applications.

Youth exhibition at a county fair – ATCP 10.40

This rule is for exemption by a member of a “Youth Agricultural Organization” at a county fair only. Birds are not eligible for sale, swap or exhibition at any other venue. Written notice by the leader of the organization which certifies the leader has inspected the premises where the youth keep the poultry and the youth provides documentation that the birds originated from a certified flock and has not commingled them with poultry or eggs from any other source.

Exhibitor is responsible for getting all required testing and certificates for their birds and bringing copies of certificates and testing to the fair.

 - Wisconsin tested flock
 - Wisconsin Associate flock

OPEN DEPARTMENT 8 – RABBITS ATCP 160.18
